Annual Meeting Report

The annual meeting, held after worship on 6 October, was no mere formality but discussed important matters concerning the future of our buildings and the life of the parish.

The usual financial statements and budget and committee reports were received. There was also considerable discussion about proposals to replace the roofs of the church, Morrison Lounge, and hall. Approval was given for proceeding with the project, and for applying to the Synod of Otago and Southland for a grant for 50% of the overall costs – likely to be of the order of \$200,000. However, no definite contracts for the work will be signed without specific approval from a further meeting of the congregation, and likewise any increase in the estimated budget will require congregational approval. We are moving, but cautiously and prudently.

The meeting also received the report o the Our Place Task Group, which has produced the *Identity and Mission in Practice* – $\bar{O}poho$ *Presbyterian Church Our Place Handbook 2024*. The meeting commended the Handbook to the Parish Council and other committees to help guide their decision-making about worship, Christian education, use of facilities, property, and finance. The Parish Council, in particular, has been charged with developing an action plan for responding to the recommendations in the Handbook and to review the governance of the parish. The Handbook is intended to be a 'living document' and suggestions for revisions for future editions will be welcomed by the Parish Council.

Gregor Macaulay and David Murray wee reappointed to the Parish Council for three-year terms and Daniel Larsen, a former member who has taken a break for a few years, has also been reappointed. And Parish Council members Julie Mander and Mark Ranby have been elected to be ordained and inducted as elders.

The meeting noted that Philip Somerville was stepping down after more than 30 continuous years of sterling service on the Session and Parish Council, including time as Parish Clerk.

Parish Council News

Daniel Larsen was welcomed back as a member of the Parish Council (after a six-year break) when it met on 17 October, and Philip Somerville's formal resignation was received.

The Council formally endorsed the decisions of the Annual Meeting concerning the reroofing project – necessary for applications to funding bodies.

Much of the meeting was taken up with discussion of the Handbook prepared by the Our Place Task Group and commended to decision-makers by the Annual Meeting. The Group itself has now been disbanded and it is now up to the Council and the Property and Finance Committee to work though the various recommendations the Group has made. Members of the Council have been given homework, to think about and comment on the recommendations. Their responses will be collated and discussed at future meetings and/or a Council retreat early next year.
