Editorial

I am reading my way through the book of Isaiah. Parts of it are well known and turn up in our church lectionary readings around Advent and Easter – 'For a child is born to us...', 'He was despised, rejected...', the Lord has anointed me to bring good news to the poor, to heal the broken hearted, announce release to the captives and freedom to the prisoner...'.

But there is a lot in the book of Isaiah that makes hard reading. Among those bits are the chapters that announce harsh judgement on Israel for its godlessness and the even greater number of chapters that denounce Israel's neighbours for their arrogance and self-sufficiency, warning that there is a terrible reckoning coming. There is a lot of hurt and anger and desire for retribution, and not a lot of forgiveness and grace among these pronouncements on Israel's enemies in Isaiah. The pushed around, punished people of Israel are also happy to crow over others, when fortunes are reversed.

It is a disturbing read against the backdrop of what is happening in our own time between Israel and the Palestinians. The response of Israel to the reprehensible kidnappings and killings of some of its citizens has now gone very far beyond the old restraint of an eye for an eye.

I was taught to approach Biblical texts with three questions -1) What does it say? 2) What did that mean to the people of the time? 3) What might it mean to us? It is the second question that offers the best protection against words that carried the pain and torment of the victims of oppression being used by the oppressors to justify appalling behaviour.

That Isaiah's writings come from the same part of the world that the current conflict is happening in, makes it dangerously easy to forget that important second question. Dangerously, because without its corrective, there is much in these chapters that might encourage the mindset of those who are doing awful things today to the populations of Gaza and Lebanon.

And our woes are not only in that part of the world. Even in our own more fortunate country we are becoming used to systems and things not working as they should. As a society we seem caught in a general grumpiness and impatience with one another. We live, too, with a crisis of perception. So much of what is put forward as beautiful, good and grand is, in fact, ugly, small and shallow, while the beauty, courage and depth in what is broken, honest and healing is largely ignored. The truth is we all need help. It is beyond our power to rescue ourselves. On the eve of Advent, we look forward to the celebration of the birth of Jesus, God's help and rescue in the middle of our mess. The way of God that Jesus shows us is not one of retribution and military might. On the contrary it is marked by compassion and care, and a regard for the ones who are ignored, shoved to the edges or moved on. It is marked by honesty, forgiveness, healing and grace.

What Jesus reveals about God is big, surprising and truly good news. It says that there is another way than 'might is right', one that is hopeful and more solid because its solidity ultimately lies in the nature of the God who created the universe and holds it. This is a way that can set us free from the paralysing mind sets of power, money, acquisitiveness and the no win of warfare. It is God's way to renew the human soul. It may seem extraordinary given all that is happening around us and within us, but these are the tidings of great joy for us and the whole of humanity – and Christmas is its beginning.

Property and Finance Committee Update

Our November meeting was a time of catching up on all the activity over the last month. A flooded basement cleanup involved a lot of person-power along with the successful fair set-up and clean-up. All this resulted in the basement having a further spring-clean and we have disposed of obsolete items. With the closing of the Kaikorai Church, we have been fortunate to be gifted a range of items: a lectern and falls, chairs for the Minister's office, music stands, folding tables for hall use, and soccer and tennis tables for games.. From the fair, a set of fine nesting tables has been added to the Morrison Lounge along with new speakers in the church. We hope you notice that the hall entrance door is opening easily and that the church vestry door lock is operating smoothly. The lawns were ably managed by Jane and Susan over October. Window painting will commence before the end of the year and in January we commence a programme of borer treatment which will continue over the next three years. Our waste bins are proving very useful and the green bin is often full with garden waste. The Seed Exchange is being visited regularly with items going in and out. Soil in the garden is looking in good shape....18 months ago the soil was almost deadbut with the application of donated mulch, pea straw, and nitrogen, we can plan for some successful planting in 2025. Our committee has worked hard to complete the funding application to Synod for our proposal to reroof the building and this has been submitted. Decisions are made by Synod in May 2025 and we will keep you informed.

Our regular groups using the hall (Steady as You Go, Pilates, Yoga, and Weaving) all plan to continue next year. We have had several people holding family celebrations along with a Scottish country dancing group. There has been an inquiry to hold Line Dancing in 2025 if there is sufficient community interest.

We have had a stellar year and look forward to 2025 – we welcome hearing your ideas and please let us know of any security or health and safety issues. *Miriam Vollweiler* (Committee convener)
