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Editorial: Have Faith

I can recall some moments when I have enjoyed a feeling of being settled, happy and grateful for where I am, and who I am with, one being when walking on a favourite beach with my husband Ross and two children on a warm balmy day. Another when I stepped into the church one Saturday afternoon and instantly felt at peace as memories of the happy times in there came flooding in. Stepping into my mother's house in the country at Earnscleugh also brought on feelings of grounding, stability, and happiness. And a large part of my life was centred around my work in an organisation I was devoted to, where I loved the work and my colleagues.

Having said that, life is not always like those moments and life comes with challenges and things we cannot predict or plan for. The Covid-19 virus is an example of this: who would have thought when we have such amazing technology and science that a tiny wee virus could affect all of the world?

I realised quite early on that I am not especially fond of change when I don't create it. But life is full of changes brought on by life, events, and natural processes out of our control.

I could not have imagined that I would be living on my own, that I no longer have a family base in Earnscleugh, or that I would be self-employed; changes that all happened in the space of 15 months.

Some friends or acquaintances would mention to me during that 15-month time that, if there was a God, these things would not happen. I notice the same comments about Covid-19: why would God let such an agent loose on the world?

It is God and the faith we have in God that gives us the comfort and strength to deal with the challenges of life. Sometimes we need to put aside the problems, or grief that we grapple with — and be still and receptive enough to hear the messages coming from God. Such messages come from all sorts of places and people; we just need to trust the Holy Spirit about what we take in.

Being a long-time singer, I find there is a song to describe or reflect on most situations in life. Songs, after all are poems set to music.

Horatio Spafford was a man who lost his wife and some of his children in the 1870s, when they were in a ship that sank at sea. When he was in another ship crossing the location of the sunk ship sometime later, he was moved to write some verses; the following is the first verse:

"When peace like a river attendeth my way; when sorrow like sea billows roll whatever my lot, thou hast taught me to say, it is well, it is well with my soul."

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The rest of his verses in his song praise God and look forward to God descending from heaven.

In the foreseeable future we are going into a period of uncertainty with the ministry in our church. We will have a change – in our minister, the style of ministry; and it will take time to form relationships with the new person.

In the not so foreseeable future we might be looking at part time or team ministry – maybe a different venue and organisation – maybe we are heading for a North End Parish?

Worship is often associated with particular buildings. Another song springs to mind.: "In this familiar place – I know the mystery of your grace". Though it is great to worship in a familiar place, it is the worshipping with others that brings the feeling of "church", not the buildings.

By working through whatever issues are before us, with our Godlistening-ears on, we will always find and have a place and time where we can meet to worship.

It is well with our souls. It will be well with our souls, if we have faith in the future.

Property and Finance Update

On the finances side I am happy to report that offerings have returned to the pre-lockdown level and we are close to our budget.

There have been positive comments following the editorial last month, suggestions, and a small increase in giving as well as a spontaneous generous donation from a neighbour. A few people have commented on the burden of having buildings that are not really fit for purpose anymore, suggesting that we need to have discussion around alternative options.

On the sobering side, the treasurer was asked to come up with a budget for a full-time minister at the five to ten year level of seniority (Margaret had just reached that level) and upon reviewing the requirements we have had to factor in the higher cost of rent in Opoho these days. So rather than a deficit of \$12,000 mentioned in the July editorial, more realistically it is about \$30,000. Bluntly put, at

the current level of income we will be up to \$30,000 short of affording full-time ministry every year without using the reserves. The Ministry Settlement Board will have that information at their next meeting.

We have also been reviewing our building insurance, recognising that if we were to rebuild, our new buildings would no doubt look very different and presumably cost substantially less than replacement value for the current complex. If, in reducing the insured value to 75% of replacement valuation there are significant savings over the current premium, then the proposal will come to a congregational meeting for further discussion and approval.

We are grappling with difficult financial considerations and I am happy to discuss them further with anyone who would like to.

Thank you to Shona Somerville for organising the display of responses to Covid-19 on Sunday 26 July.

The Parish Council has asked the Christian Development Committee to consider what useful lessons for our church can be taken from the lockdown. What has it taught us about the strengths or weaknesses of our ways of doing things in the parish? Memorial Minute - Allan James Cloughley (1945-2019)

At its meeting in March, the Parish Council agreed to record the following minute in memory of Allan Cloughley.



Allan James Cloughley was born the youngest of four children to Mavis and Stan Cloughley of Invercargill on 3 November 1945. He left school at the end of his fourth form year (Year 10) to begin an apprenticeship as a cabinet maker and a joiner. He was drafted into the army where he was a driver and cook.

Pam and Allan married in March 1969. Their first house was a cottage in Kennington, Southland. A year later they moved to Alexandra

where their children were adopted: Matthew, Hunter, and Meegan. During this time Allan was setting up his own joinery business, he was involved in the Round Table service club, including the office of president, coaching rugby for his sons, and helping his wife Pam and his older sister Mai with the Lions' float for the annual Blossom Festival parade.

In the late 1970s the family moved to Cromwell where Allan was managing a joinery factory for Naylor Love. The family were in Britain for three months in 1980. When they came back, Allan started his own business again. Throughout the 1980s and 1990s the family moved several times around Cromwell as they bought houses, renovated and sold them, sometimes the first signal that the house was for sale being when the real estate agent arrived with customers to show around.

The family moved to Dunedin in 1994. Allan and Pam became involved with Opoho Presbyterian Church about 1996. At Opoho Allan was on the Property and Finance Committee. Having a handyman in the congregation was a breath of fresh air for a membership of academics, musicians, retired clergy, and

theologians. The practical jobs were always done and Allan was there to volunteer. There was not a part of the church that Allan has not worked on.

As well, Allan and Pam were part of the hospitality of the church: in the kitchen, picking up people for APW, Fellowship Group, and church services, and other roles.

In recent years Allan and Pam moved out of a two-bedroom house into a caravan that allowed them to travel around New Zealand in the summer months and house-sit at Macandrew Bay during the winter months.

On seventh December his soul took flight his body finally at rest, he leaves a hole that'll be hard to fill he really was one of God's blest.

We give thanks for the life of Allan Cloughley, and pray for Pam, Matthew, Hunter, and Meegan, and his wider family.



Our monthly gathering in July, the first since the Covid shutdown, was an opportunity to catch up and it turned out to be fortunate that we didn't have a speaker. The 10 of us talked and shared very comfortably about our lockdown experiences: banking, shopping, loneliness, community, walking, memories of previous infectious disease events, history, and more. Chris and I have asked people not to bring food as we want to do the baking. We go walking most evenings and swap recipe ideas. It's an opportunity for us to try them out!

At our August meeting, Gregor Macaulay will speak on his research and book about young men from Opoho who went to the First World War, many of whom died. We welcome you to join us in the Morrison Lounge on Thursday 13 August, 2.00-3.30 p.m.

We'll have a little time at the start to hear candidates' views on the End of Live Choice Bill and marijuana legalisation.


