Editorial – Of Flocks and Dissimulations

Birds have some inspired collective nouns. Some particularly excellent examples include: a wisdom of owls, a convocation of eagles, a watch of nightingales, a lamentation of swans, or (my personal favourite) an exultation of larks. Evident in these descriptions are human feelings evoked by the birds in question. In some cases, birds are associated with human traits and characteristics.

A while back we were challenged to consider the kind of bird which most represents God in our lives. The challenge was meant as fun but also to get us thinking about the ways in which God is with us. This seems apt during the season of creation when we might thank God for all the creatures that fly in the sky.

Typically, we might think of a dove which is directly associated with the Holy Spirit in Scripture and is a long-standing symbol of peace and of the covenant between God and humanity.

I think of Christ as being more like common pigeons. Pigeons are birds of the street and are ever present in our city. They seem unpretentious and live alongside humans. They are simultaneously loved whilst being derided as pests. There are many collective nouns for pigeons which may reflect the proliferation of pigeons around the world. Many cultures have stories of pigeons saving people or creatures.

Pigeons seldom stray or get lost. They are able navigators and will find their way home.

Pigeons were historically used to carry important messages. Pigeons have been considered heroes of multiple conflicts in many parts of the world. This illustrates how a symbol of peace can be used to spark a whole lot of trouble.

Today many people believe pigeons to be associated with being calm, steadfast, or rooted. They are also seen to carry spiritual messages of significance. The humble pigeon forms long-lasting relationships and can mate for life. As far as animals go, the pigeon is a great parent. Unsurprisingly, the pigeon is also a symbol of love.

These incredible birds have great vision and can recognise themselves in a mirror. Unfortunately, they are unable to detect the presence of glass while flying.

There will be ways in which pigeons cause problems. This will be true of many animals and particularly true of introduced species. There will also be delightful features of other birds which are redolent of some aspect of our God.

You do not have to be a pigeon to find a spiritual home or to share important messages.

To celebrate Harriet's seventh birthday, we took a small group of children on the *Monarch* to see the albatrosses. We were lucky enough to see an albatross

take off from the water. This is a remarkable sight. The way in which albatrosses glide does seem to celebrate creation itself. There are three collective terms for albatrosses being "a flight", "a rookery", or "a weight". The last one of these seems odd because I have never seen a bird appear quite so weightless as an albatross. Surely it ought to be an exaltation of albatrosses, but I suppose "a flight" will do.

Steady as You Go Update

In April 2022 Jane Anderson approached Opoho Church asking if they would support hosting the Age Concern strength and balance exercise class in the hall. Her vision has resulted in a weekly Tuesday afternoon class from 1.30 to 2.30 which on 10 September had 13 participants. There are many more people coming overall but each week there are people away and new faces turning up. The feedback is positive on the value of this class and the way community social connections are created. Chris Young and Isla have trained up as leaders and run the class, attending trainers' updates with Age Concern. Once a month Chris bakes a cake and puts on afternoon tea – this is a special touch and is appreciated. It has become a ritual to invite Steady as You Go participants to join the Fellowship soup kitchen and end of year Christmas dinner.

Yoga and Pilates Update from a Newbie

Yoga on a Monday morning 10-11 has an almost full hall with people from around the areas.
