think about new legislation without considering the policy, the committees, the submissions, and the drafting processes which precede law. Transition may follow a new beginning but the beginning is often a small step or even a thought.

These school holidays I have been endeavouring to clear out my house. My family and I have more possessions than we need (and, in particular, paraphernalia for younger children than we now have). The process of tidying is one where things often look messiest about halfway through. This mess is an important part of the tidying process. Challenges can be a part of change and growth.

It can be more difficult to think of new beginnings in the winter when the land seems bare and the nights are cold and long. But the land is full of new beginnings in the winter. Several enthusiastic bulbs in my garden appear to have adopted this interpretation and have begun to appear from the earth.

Aotearoa recently celebrated Matariki, marking the M ori new year. I understand this is a season of preparation, a season to learn, and a season plan. Perhaps it is the beginning of growth. In its own quiet, steady way, winter is as much a time for new beginnings as spring.

A single journey may include various beginnings. This is tremendous as it means any given moment is an opportunity start anew. Faith can begin with the smallest flame. Faith is a journey. For me, belief challenges. Belief invites exploration and contemplation alike. It is not too late to journey, to learn, and to grow.

Growth does not mean the loss of traditions. If there is a way of doing things which worked well on a previous adventure, it may work well next journey. Many traditions have developed over long periods of time and work well. Indeed, growth is seldom sudden. Perhaps the art lies in knowing when and how to challenge ourselves.

Following, Clare's recent induction, Clare said she was looking forward to seeing what we might get up to together. I share in Clare's sense of adventure. Let us see what we will get up to next.

Operation Cover Up



During our worship service on Sunday 18 July, the eight blankets Opoho Church is contributing this year to Operation Cover Up were blessed.

The project is run by *Mission Without Borders* which is a Christian charity originally set up 60 years ago to get Bibles into the Soviet Union.

Operation Cover Up is under the umbrella of *Mission Without Borders* and was started in 2000. It was started in Opoho by Mrs Kirsten Westerskov (Tui Bevin's mother), then Abby Smith coordinated it, and in more recent years, me.

The operation is at least nationwide in New Zealand. We knit squares that are sewn up into blankets, and these are collected from throughout the country and dispatched in shipping containers to Eastern Europe, where the blankets are distributed to all age groups through aid networks and programmes. In most years, two containers are sent from New Zealand. 

Step 7) August: Batteries Bible verse: James 3: 8-10

The tongue is a restless evil, full of deadly poison! With it we bless our Lord and Father, and with it we curse those who are made in the likeness of God. From the same mouth comes both blessing and cursing. E te whanau, this should not be so!

'Big Idea'

Every cordless device we use has a battery in it. They are great while they work, but then what? If batteries are tossed out with your kerbside rubbish or recycling, the hazardous substances they contain could cause a fire in the rubbish truck or recycling plant. If they end up in landfill, the poisons inside batteries may leak out into soil and ground water.

Do we know what will happen to it when it dies?

How come we use toxic substances every day, without a thought?

Discuss James's challenge about the words that we speak.

When can words be poisonous?

What toxic attitudes and behaviours do we take for granted as 'normal'?

We often feel drained. How does God 'recharge your batteries'?!

Action Step for August

Set up a Batteries Box at your church. Get an artist (or the kids!) to design it so it looks cool. Every couple of months empty it at your Council recycling depot.

At home and at church, stop buying things that need throw-away batteries.

Switch to recyclable rechargeable batteries.

Prayer

Lord of all, we confess that the words we speak can hurt.

Guard our tongues, that we may not wound one another.

We confess that the things we use every day hurt our environment.

Inspire our choices, that what we use, including batteries, may not wound your creation.

Guard our living that we might be people of faith in the small things and in the big things,

through Christ our friend and the Holy Spirit our Energiser, Amen.
